### WHAT IS HEPATITIS C?

- Hepatitis C is a viral infection that causes liver inflammation. It can lead to serious liver damage, liver failure, liver cancer, and even death.
- Hepatitis C infection is caused by the Hepatitis C virus (HCV). The infection spreads when blood contaminated with the virus enters the bloodstream of an uninfected person.

### **SYMPTOMS**

- Many people who are infected do not look or feel sick, and they have no symptoms. In many cases, Hepatitis C is only diagnosed after the patient develops liver problems.
- Some people show mild to severe symptoms, including:
  - Fever or fatigue
  - Loss of appetite, nausea, and/or vomiting
  - Abdominal or joint pain
  - Dark urine or clay-colored bowel movements
  - Jaundice (yellow skin)

#### **TESTING**

Visit The DOCK or talk to your doctor about being tested for Hepatitis C if any of the following are true:

- Born between 1945 through 1965
- Treated for a blood clotting problem before 1987
- A beneficiary of donated blood, blood products, and organs before July 1992
- Have abnormal liver tests or liver disease
- Born to a mother infected with Hepatitis C
- Received body piercing or tattoos performed with non-sterile instruments
- Work in health care or public safety and exposed to blood through a needle stick or sharp objects
- Had sexual contact with someone infected or potentially infected with Hepatitis C
- Current or past injection drug user (including if you injected once or many years ago)
- Received long-term hemodialysis treatment or dialysis for kidney failure
- Share personal care items such as razors or toothbrushes with an infected person
- Diagnosed with HIV

A screening test shows whether you have developed antibodies to the Hepatitis C virus. If the test is positive, a second test is needed to confirm if the virus is still present.

#### **PREVENTION**

- There is no vaccine to protect you from the Hepatitis C virus.
- If you are sexually active, particularly with multiple partners, protect yourself by using latex condoms and water-based lubricants.
- An acute infection can clear on its own without treatment in about 25% of people. Further treatment can preempt a chronic infection.
